Some families are entitled to some extra financial support. If you are struggling on a low income, you may be entitled to this extra help, even if you haven't claimed anything before.

This guide is designed to give you some information and advice on where you can get this help, who qualifies for it and where / how you can apply. The document contains embedded/underlined links which will take you straight to the relevent site or any application process to help you in what you have to do. Please do pass this guide on to anyone you think can make use of it.

FREE SCHOOL MEALS IN EDINBURGH SCHOOLS

The cost of a free school meal for a child at High School in Edinburgh is £2.95 per day. If you currently receive any of the supports listed below and feel you may qualify, you must apply online at school.grants@edinburgh.gov.uk or using this link https://www.edinburgh.gov.uk/xfp/form/261. If you application is successful, you will also qualify for a school clothing grant.

FOOD BANK

Referrals for access to the foodbank can be made by Holy Rood RC High School in complete confidence.

THE EDINBURGH POLICE FUND FOR CHILDREN

This fund provides grants for clothing and footwear to children in Edinburgh who are in need of assistance. A family who is resident in Edinburgh and meet the criteria, receive a grant from the fund to use for coats or footwear.

Applications can be made by asking school staff who can make the application on your behalf (see above). The grant can also be applied for through Social Work, support worker, health visitor or community nurses.

EDINBURGH SCHOOL BANK FOR UNIFORMS

The Edinburgh School Uniform Bank distribute bespoke packs of new school uniform to hundreds of Edinburgh families each year, as well as supplying nearly new uniform to schools and community groups.

Applications can be made by asking the school who can make the application on your behalf (see above).

ADULT DISABILTY PAYMENT

<u>Adult Disability Payment</u> is extra money to help you if you have a disability or long-term health condition that affects your everyday life. Adult Disability Payment is made up of 2 parts:

- ✓ Daily living
- ✓ Mobility

You may qualify for one or both parts.

The amount you get depends on how your condition affects your ability to do everyday activities and get around. It does not matter if you're working or not. Your income and savings are not taken into account.

BEST START GRANT AND FUNDS

<u>Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods</u> are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. They're part of the 5 family payments you may be able to get from Social Security Scotland, along with <u>Scottish Child Payment</u>. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- ✓ Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- ✓ Early Learning Payment
- ✓ School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit.

You can claim if you or your partner are entitled to:

<u>UNIVERSAL CREDIT</u> – You must have been receiving Universal Credit in the monthly assessment period in which you apply, or the one before that.

You can also still apply if you are under 18 or you are 18 or 19 and a dependent on someone else's claim because you are still at college. If you have recently become responsible for a child, like a kinship carer, you may also qualify for a payment. Click on any of the links above to apply or call 0800 182 2222.

CHILD DISABILITY PAYMENT

This benefit is for children and young people aged between three months and 18 years who have lived with a disability for at least three months and who can expect to continue to have this disability for at least six months.

Qualifying children aged three months or over will be entitled to a payment for their care. Children over three years old can also get a payment to help with their mobility needs.

Qualifying for this may also entitle you to The Winter Heating Assistance for Children and Young People. This is currently a payment of £235.70 for children and young people up to the age of 18. To get this payment, you must meet two criteria on at least one day in the third full week of September (called the "qualifying week"). On that day you must:

- ✓ Get the highest rate care component of Disability Living Allowance for children. (Currently £101.75 per week with a high-rate mobility component of £71.00 per week. This is paid four weekly on a Tuesday.)
- ✓ Be resident in Scotland.

THE SCOTTISH CHILD PAYMENT

The <u>Scottish Child Payment</u> gives eligible families on low incomes an extra £25 per week per child which you receive every four weeks.

You can claim if you have a child and receive:

COUNCIL TAX REDUCTION

- ✓ If you are currently paying full Council Tax payments, you can make a claim for a Council Tax reduction if you:
- √ have savings of less than £16,000
- ✓ are responsible for paying the Council Tax bill.
- ✓ have a low income from benefits or work, including self-employment.

You may still get a Council Tax reduction if your savings are more than £16,000 and you or your partner get the Guarantee Credit part of Pension Credit.

You can apply for a reduction at the same time as you claim for Housing Benefit.

DISCRETIONARY HOUSING PAYMENT (DHP)

If your Housing Benefit or Universal Credit Housing Costs doesn't cover all of your rent and you are having difficulty paying the shortfall, you may be able to get a Discretionary Housing Payment (DHP) to help. DHP can help, for example if you:

- Are seeking more affordable accommodation and require assistance with a deposit, rent in advance or removal costs.
- \checkmark Are affected by the introduction of the benefit cap and are seeking employment.
- ✓ Have been affected by previous Housing Benefit changes such as the extension of the Local Housing Allowance shared room rate to under 35s.
- ✓ Have higher living costs because you are sick or disabled.

Even if you are not sure you qualify, you can still make a claim to find out by using this online link - Start Claim

SCOTTISH WELFARE FUND(S)

To apply for a grant from the Scottish Welfare Fund, you must be 16 or older and on a low income, or receiving benefits such as Universal Credit, Income Support, Job Seekers Allowance, or Pension Credit. There are different grants you can apply for depending on your circumstances. **You do not need to pay these grants back.** You can apply for a:

<u>Crisis Grant</u> – to help with an unexpected emergency like a fire or flood, losing your money or your job or even with cost of living crisis.

<u>Community Care Grant</u> – to help you or someone you care for to start to live, or to carry on living, a settled life in the community.

You need to apply through your own local council. The link to apply for Edinburgh is here. <u>Edinburgh Welfare</u> <u>Fund Application</u>

EDUCATION MAINTENANCE ALLOWANCE (EMA)

Education Maintenance Allowance or EMA gives financial support to eligible 16 to 19 year-olds, who have reached school leaving age but who want to continue in their learning. There are three main qualifying elements to EMA.

<u>Residency</u> - There's different arrangements in place for different immigration statuses. Your own local council and place of education will be able to let you know if can get EMA with your current residency status in your area.

<u>Household Income</u> - To qualify, households with one dependent child must be earning £24,421 per year or less, and households with more than one dependent child must be earning £26,884 or less, before tax. Dependent children are those up to the age of 16 and those between the age of 16 and 25 in full time further or higher education.

<u>Education</u> - As well as the above, you can only qualify for EMA if you're any one of these:

- ✓ Attending school full time.
- ✓ Home Educated or in Flexi-Schooling
- ✓ On a full or part-time non-advanced course in a college or education centre.

You can only get EMA if you're on a non-advanced course (those studying up to and including Advanced Highers at school, college or through home education). If you think you qualify for EMA, you need to complete the following every academic year:

- ✓ An EMA application form
- ✓ A learning agreement.

EMA is a weekly payment of £30, paid every 2 weeks in arrears. You can apply direct to your school or using this link to Edinburgh Council. – <u>Apply for EMA</u>

Social Care Direct Edinburgh – During office hours, you can call 0131 200 2327 to report any concerns you have about the care and welfare of any child or young person in Edinburgh. The Edinburgh Out of Hours Emergency Social Work number is 0800 731 6969 which is available out of normal office hours.

<u>KinshipScot</u> – A great website full of links and supports for families in Edinburgh.

<u>Kindred</u> – This is a charitable organisation run by parents to support children and young people with complex needs. Its website provides great ideas and links to information and financial grants which families meeting the criteria can apply for.

<u>Parenting Across Scotland</u> – Another great website for helplines across Scotland, access to parenting information and benefits advice as well as a great 'Top 10 Tips' section for parents and carers.

<u>Children 1st Parentline</u> – This website gives valuable information about means tested benefits and counselling advice to all parents and carers in Scotland.

<u>Partners in Advocacy</u> – provide independent advocacy for individuals living with learning disabilities, autistic spectrum disorders, physical disabilities. They also provide independent advocacy to children and young people who are living with mental health issues, additional support needs and learning disabilities.

<u>CPAG – The Children's Poverty Action Group Scotland</u> – The CPAG site is a one stop shop for welfare rights and benefit advice for families with children and young people. It offers national guides and guidance to many of the benefits mentioned in this guide.

<u>ClothesBank+</u> - This is part of The Edinburgh City Mission which provides valuable help in lots of areas for vulnerable families. Like the Police Clothing Scheme, the school can make a referral on behalf of a family who require good quality day to day clothing for both children and adults.

<u>CHAI</u> - The Community Help and Advice Initiative support people living across Edinburgh and the Lothians.to relieve poverty, provide social welfare assistance, practical help and to provide information, advice, and support. Their website is easy to navigate to all the services they provide.

<u>Edinburgh Carer Assistance Fund</u> - To support carers, VOCAL has received funding from the Scottish Government and City of Edinburgh to establish a Carer Assistance Fund. Each carer household can apply for a one-off £250 - £500 grant.

Care & Repair Edinburgh

Care & Repair offer a range of services designed to make it easier for older and disabled Edinburgh residents to live independently. Using a set of trusted and vetted tradespeople, they can help with maintenance tasks, small
